Dear Beloved's of St Matthew's Faith Community ...

In my Prep4Sabbath email sent out Friday February 09th, I mentioned a visioning day. Whenever I arrive in a new call, I like to invite the community to gather informally to pray, to dialogue, to listen to one another, to heed the call of where God is calling us to serve. It should come as no surprise to us that how we've been the church (the people of God) for the past century has changed. We remember the glory days of Baby Boomers filling the building to the point of needing additions. Yet many of us have family who do not participate in the life of community. That does not necessarily mean they are not believers, it means that gathering in worship never rocked their holy world. And, if we are honest with ourselves, we never really went after our 'siblings in faith' to understand what didn't work for them. Please do not hear this fact as

judgement - we were not a faith tradition that was big on witness and evangelism. I don't think we were taught how to put our faith about God, the Holy Spirit, Jesus, into words - without envisioning street corner prophets with their signs of John 3.16. In fact, our worship did not include a section where worshippers could even share their own stories of how God has worked in their lives.

We support a model of church where one person does most of the talking and no-one else has an opportunity to respond to what's being said, let alone ask questions. We all learned to sit still, be quiet and if you were a child of the 60's or 70's - you were told 'children should be seen and not heard'. Maybe, the community we experience today reflects those who left because their voices were not respected or honoured. Regardless of the why - we here at St Matthew's, having just celebrated 150 years of being God in our little corner of the world, need to have a discussion about our future.

As our numbers have decreased, so too have our offerings and volunteers ... and the answer is not calling Pastor Lori to fill the church! If only it were that simple. But where is God calling us in this day? No one person can answer this question, but together - oh, the possibilities!

Please mark this day on your calendar and come ... all voices welcome. Pastor Tanya and I did seminary and were ordained together! I've asked her to come facilitate our Visioning Day so that I may participate in the day with you.

The Quiet Room is located next to the Pastor's office. Refurbishing of this room included: installing wire mold to cover data cables, painting the walls, installing new lighting in the ceiling, cleaning the carpet, purchasing new furniture, purchasing a new window blind, installing wall décor, purchasing a canvas for a wall, and a plaque for the door.

Visiting someone with dementia?

Use these tips for meaningful visits

Whether you are visiting someone with dementia every day or just once in a while, making the most of your time together will mean a more meaningful visit for both of you!

A person with dementia may have many visitors and service providers dropping by. A visitor guest book can serve as a reminder of who has come to visit and how they spent their time together. For more information about creating a visitor guest book, please visit alzheimer.ca/visitorguestbook

- 1. Find out the best time of day to visit. It may be during the middle of the day when the person you are visiting isn't tired yet.
- 2. Keep in mind that what you call the person you are visiting may have to change over time. As the dementia progresses they may not recognize you. Calling them by their first name is often the most familiar option.
- 3. Turn off background noise to make the visit peaceful and less confusing.
- 4. Encourage the person you are visiting to make decisions about how you spend time together to enhance independence and self-esteem.
- 5. Play a game or work on a project together as a way to connect, create a sense of purpose, and provide something to look forward to. Do a jigsaw puzzle Label photographs Make a scrapbook Bring two copies of the same newspaper or book so that you can both read and discuss it.
- 6. Have a relaxing visit with a movie and some treats. Quiet time during a visit can be very meaningful. Remember, not all communication is verbal.
- 7. Go outside to get the benefits of fresh air and exercise
- 8. Include others in the visit even if they can't be there physically. Photographs Videos Letters Phone call or video ca
- 9. Answer difficult questions the person you are visiting may have by acknowledging their feelings and reassuring them that they are safe, loved, and cared for. Common questions include asking when they can go home or where a person who died is.
- 10. Bring a child to visit, which can be fun and helps maintain important relationships. Use these tips:
 - Discuss with the child what dementia is and what to expect regarding the person you are visiting.
 - Listen to the child's feelings and concerns.
 - Explain to the child that during the visit they should speak clearly, avoid arguing, and ask for help anytime.
 - Bring along a quiet activity that the child and the person you are visiting can do together, like a jigsaw puzzle
 - Get outdoors by sitting outside, going for a walk, or even helping with some weeding if there is a garden area.
 - Have the child give something they made to the person you are visiting, like a picture or some homemade cookies.
 - Have some treats handy that the person with dementia can give to the child

King Cakes for Epiphany

King cakes for Epiphany is a tradition introduced to St. Matthew's by Pastor Clyde and Midge Wentzel during the time Pastor Clyde was interim pastor here. There are three cakes shaped and decorated like crowns, and each one holds an almond as a hidden surprise. The three people who find an almond in their piece of cake get to wear a crown.

On this day of Epiphany, three kings traveled to Bethlehem, bearing gifts to the newborn baby Jesus. To honor this belief, people celebrate with king cakes, symbolizing the unity of faiths.



A number of years ago, when St. Matthew's hosted a Warming Centre one day a week during the winter months, we gathered hats, mitts and socks to give away to anyone in need. Some of those items were still packed in boxes and stored in our auditorium. When the weather began to get colder in December we took the boxes to Light on Main.
