

#### **Bible Book Club**

The final two books to study in this series are 1 Corinthians and Revelations. This concludes the study of Biblical books selected by Bishop Susan.

#### **July Book Study: 1st Corinthians**

1 Corinthians is thought to have been written between 53 and 55 CE and is one of three letters written by Paul (or a student of Paul) to the church in Corinth. The first letter has been lost.

The book has 16 chapters, so you might spend 2 days per chapter, unravelling Paul's sentences to highlight the point of the paragraph. Many of these points give us first-hand information about the day-to-day realities in the early church and are relevant to our world today. Paul focuses on love being different than control; love being different than discipline; replacing displays of social status with love; and Paul attacks the privileges of the elite praising love as the better way for the church to live. The very familiar 'Love is patient' passage appears in chapter 13, and the book concludes with the good news of how God's love will be everything to everyone in the resurrection.

#### **August Book Selection: Revelation**

"John" is named as the author of Revelation, possible the beloved apostle of Jesus. Scholars believe the book was written late in the first century, a time when Roman authorities demanded that emperors be worshiped as gods.

The book is written in *apocalypse* style – which means an unveiling or revealing of something that was previously hidden. The story does not have a logical progression of a story line, but rather offers a series of visions. The visions are either terrifying or celebrations.

This book has 22 chapters so focusing on one chapter per day will cover the book in a month. Rather than reading this as a prediction with signs of end times, try to experience it as visions of possibilities of what is the centre of Christian life.

Enjoy your study over the summer. I am available and interested to hear your thoughts and opinions about these books.

It is always more interesting to read the Bible with a group of people so hopefully as the fall progresses we may be able to meet for in person Bible Study.
