From the Pastor's desk: For this newsletter I relinquish my space to the confirmation class. We were studying Paul's letters and the task was for us to write a 'Paul Style letter' to the congregation. (A wise person declared that listening to young people keeps our minds agile) - so here are words from the parish youth, in the style of the Apostle Paul:

To the people of South Grey Bruce Lutheran Parish:

The confirmation class greets you and wishes you every good blessing. We give thanks for your prayers as we gathered to study the Bible and the history of the Lutheran Church. Your support encourages us.

We are thankful for the new things which are being done in our worship together: hearing the pastor sing and the congregation repeat makes it easy for some of us who don't know all of the hymns you use. We also wondered about the Spanish words in some of the music, but learned that our church is alive in many different places and languages. That encourages us.

We note that it is sometimes difficult to know where to follow along with the words of the service - front of the book, back of the book, different books. We need to think about how to make that easier.

We also encourage the grown-ups not to hesitate to have conversations about uncomfortable things which are important in our world today. Some topics are: seeking knowledge about indigenous culture; gender and marriage conversation; including diverse groups in our gatherings; and especially pursuing training to be more equitable, inclusive and accessible as a church community. The church needs to be informed and active in these areas so that unjust ways are corrected.

We had a lot of fun hearing some of our favorite Christian music during our confirmation service. Could we use that kind of music more often? We all have our favorite and treasured songs. You might like to learn some of our favorites. (that would encourage us too)

Thankyou for listening to our thoughts, and again, we are grateful for your support. God bless you and keep God's church strong and its members faithful.

Refugee Resettlement | A rural-urban partnership

“When you open yourself to something new, God will grab it by the tail,” says Pamela McNeil, pastor of the South Grey Bruce Parish in Ontario. The three congregations under her leadership have formed a refugee sponsorship partnership with Resurrection Lutheran Church in Halifax, N.S.

“We know resources are limited in rural communities, so bringing a refugee family here, well, it could be difficult for them to adjust,” says McNeil. “That’s the beauty of the arrangement with Halifax. The family will come to Halifax, and we will provide the funding.”

The three Ontario churches have committed to raising \$27,000–\$30,000 over three years and the Halifax church will welcome the family and help them get settled when they arrive. So far, the South Grey Bruce parish has raised close to \$20,000.

“It’s all come from donations from the congregations,” she says. “We haven’t had any fundraisers with the public yet because of COVID-19.”

The idea for the partnership came from McNeil’s seminary placement at the Halifax church. Resurrection Lutheran Church already had a dedicated ministry to refugees in place when she arrived. They had welcomed families from Ethiopia and Eritrea. Those families met other newcomers and invited them to come to church to practice their English.

“They just started coming,” recalls McNeil. “We had people from all over the world coming. And I witnessed the richness that came to the congregation through them.”

Arriving at her new parish, McNeil learned the congregations had been exploring what it means to be one in the body of Christ. Over the years they had each seen attendance wane as families moved to larger centres for work and education opportunities—a familiar story in rural life. They had their own worship spaces that they were attached to, but knew they needed to collaborate to keep going.

“To be one doesn’t necessarily mean you have to sell your building and meet in one space,” says McNeil. “So, I presented the idea for a refugee sponsorship partnership, and they were on board.”

It was a relatively easy ‘yes’ for the members of the three congregations — many of whom had refugee stories in their own families.

“You’ll find that in many Lutheran churches,” says McNeil. “My mom came to Canada in the 1950s as a refugee from Ukraine. It was the Lutheran church that organized that. Like the congregation in Halifax, and the congregations here, my heart is for refugees because of my mom’s experience.”

Asked what she would say to other congregations who are considering refugee sponsorship, McNeil says go for it.

“Even if you are in an area that is not ideal for a new family to come, find partners. There are congregations in bigger centres. You’ll have a friendship with a new congregation and with the refugee family arriving. When you open to living like Christ, God will surprise in ways you can’t imagine.”

The competition to get into this program is quite challenging, I've been told. Those cherry Tomatoes!



FICTION: I always plant them with the happy dream of strolling through the garden and picking a few of those lovely, multi-coloured cherry tomatoes, and popping them in my mouth – sweet and warm from the lovely sun. (that happens once!)

FACT: They grow out of control and millions of them seem to line every available surface in my kitchen, waiting for that salad which I never get around to making!

SOLUTION: This is a variation on a recipe given to me by Linda Yenssen. I make it at various times throughout the summer, and freeze in pint size jars to use during the winter for a ‘true’ tomato flavour. Thaw and toss with hot pasta; add to a salad that calls for tomato; spread over cooked chicken or fish; use on toasted garlic bread for a quick side or appetizer.

Recipe: (loosely adjust ingredients based on the quantity of tomatoes)

5 cups cherry tomatoes - sliced in half

4 cloves garlic, smashed

3 tbsp good quality oil – canola or olive

3 tbsp balsamic vinegar-I prefer fruit flavoured (cherry, or blueberry from Southampton)

¼ tsp black pepper

Chopped fresh basil

Toss ingredients together and place a parchment lined cookie sheet. Roast for at least 15 minutes or until tender.

Use some right away – you will have to because the aroma is soooo very wonderful.

Spoon into sterilized pint jars and freeze. The mixture thaws fairly quickly on the counter or heat for a minute in the microwave. This can be a fast treat or meal for busy days during the winter.

Added bonus- your counter won't have piles of guilt producing cherry tomatoes all summer long!

Best summer adventures to you! (by the way – we may need help later on – our garden neighbour has 8 thriving zucchini plants – oh nooooo!)
