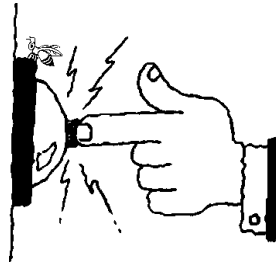

But if you put the letters in the right order, you find John's real message:

Did the story of Lazarus coming back from the tomb remind you of mummies, zombies or how you celebrate Halloween?! —

Well, that's not just by accident:

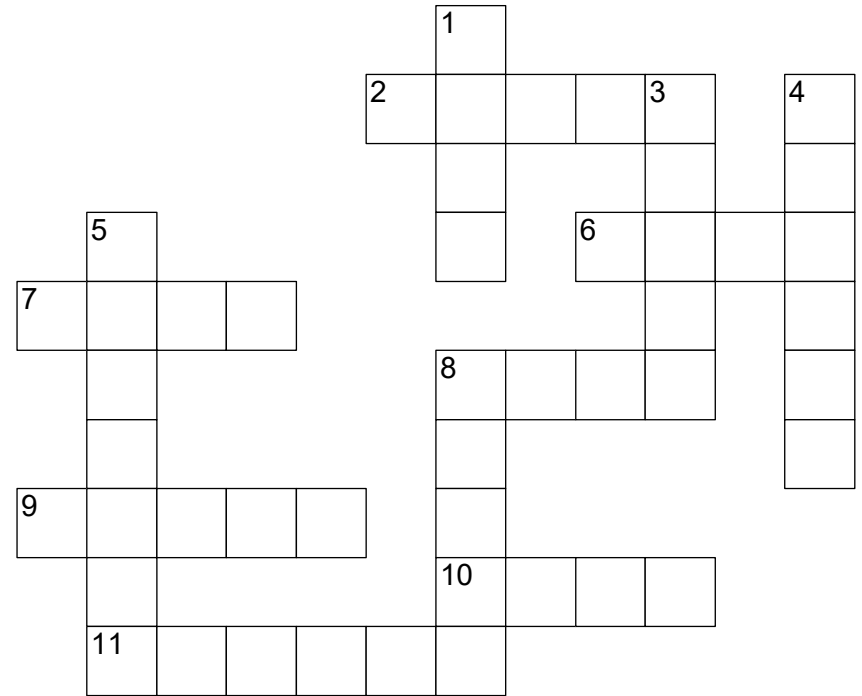
Halloween, originally spelled Hallowe'en, is shortened from All Hallows' (= All Saints') Even (short for 'evening').

Both holidays are actually closely related: they both deal with the dead and life after death.

As Christians we believe that God will not let us lie dead in the grave, but instead we believe in the resurrection of the dead. Esp. We are sure that all who belong to God because of their baptism, will live with him forever. In many congregations, on All Saints' Day those who have died are remembered by reading their names. And no, we don't think they play pranks on us or want to scare us, but that they hope to be reunited with us, just like we hope to be reunited with them one day in God's kingdom.
